

## Reconstruction In Arkansas 1862-1874

South of the Arkansas River the movement was hampered by the activities of the Confederates who were exceedingly anxious to prevent any demonstrations of loyalty to the United States. But despite Confederate vigilance the most pretentious of all these gatherings was at Benton, Saline County, December 4, 1863. It was promoted and dominated by soldiers, but had every appearance of a gathering of influential private citizens. Enoch H. Vance, a radical Unionist of the community, presided, and the Hon. Willis Jones a resident of Pike County, acted as secretary. A committee of thirteen, representing five counties, submitted resolutions denouncing slavery and rebellion, endorsing the conduct of the war by the federal authorities, and calling on "a loyal citizens of Arkansas to organize and arm and piedge themselves that they would never lay down their arms until the rebellion was crushed and slavery eradicated. "But at this meeting, held in the quiet hours of the night, the politicians appeard. The ubiquitous Fishback ventured out from Little Rock to lend his influence to the cause. At the close of the proceedings he discussed the resolutions seriatim and endorsed them, but he failed to control the situation.

## Prairie Grove Battlefield Park Prairie Grove, Arkansas 72753

Here a major battle was fought in the war between the states on December 7, 1862. A few brief details of that battle are given: The battle begins when Confederate General Hindman plans to drive General Blunt out of Northwest Arkansas, which the Federals have held since the battle of Pea Ridge in March. While enroute north, Hindman learns that Blunt has called for help from General Herron, so the Confederates establish themselves on the ridge at Prairle Grove, facing north and east, and await Herron's attack. Herron and the Union Forces cross the Illinois River and attack, resulting in a bloody but indecisive battle. General Blunt hears the cannon at Prairie Grove and approaches the battle from the northwest, arriving on the field at 2 p.m. As the battle ensues, the Confederates run low on supplies and ammunition, so during the night, Hindman withdraws to Van Buren, Arkansas. Blunt moves to Rhea's Mill and Herron moves to Fayetteville and the battle ends leaving behind many dead and wounded. The ghosts of more that 339 dead remain at Prairie Grove. The 1,630 wounded recover or die in homes along the Cane Hill and Cove Creek roads, or in the hospitals at Fayetteville.
